

The following information is from the SNA COVID-19 June 2020 SFS Survey for the Western states:

Q: Is your program -Serving Fewer, -About the Same, or -More Total Meals?

- Western 75.8% fewer, 8.6% same, 15.6% more meals served
- Of those serving fewer meals, over 55% of them are serving over 50% less meals.

64.9% expect a profit loss for the 2019-2020 SY.

Financial loss is expect to be between \$42K to \$2.6M

Farmers to Families Food Box

USDA is partnering with farmers, ranchers, specialty crop producers, food processors and distributors, and non-profit organizations to ensure that all Americans have access to the fresh and wholesome food they need during the COVID-19 national emergency.



Farmers

sell food previously destined for restaurants and bulk purchasers to distributors, preventing waste

Distributors

partner with USDA to package family-sized boxes with fresh produce, dairy and meat products, then transport them to non-profits across America

Families

pick up food boxes from local schools, food banks, faith-based organizations and other non-profits





Block Grant (2019)

- The RUSD Food Hub was awarded a contract on May 15, 2020
 Fill and distribute 7050 produce boxes over 6 weeks.
 \$204,500 value of the contract (\$29.00 per box reimbursement)
- Extension of the contract granted on June 1, 2020
 Fill and distribute 10,000 produce and dairy boxes over 8 weeks.
 \$320,000 value of the contract (\$32.00 per box reimbursement)

Allowed us to utilize RUSD Nutrition Services staff providing income for staff that was "off contract" for the summer.

USDA requirements – Round 1 and 2

Technical Capacity - Ability to purchase and pack boxes such as infrastructure (warehouse, dock, truck, kitchen) to safely pack and distribute boxes.

Technical Plan – Provide and written plan to implement the contract.

Financial Capacity – Ability to pay farmers/suppliers and wait for reimbursement (District financial statements)

Price – Seemed to be the least important of the contract.

USDA Requirements – Round 3

You will need to become a BOA (Basic Ordering Agreement) vendor.

This will allow you to prepare USDA boxes until August 15, 2022 based on need and funding.

Previous requirements apply, but it appears price has been elevated to the same level as other requirements.

Round 3 box requirements Mixed box 30-40 lbs. required.

2-3 lbs. Root vegetables – Carrots, onions, potatoes etc.

2-3 lbs. Long lasting fruit – Apples, citrus, stone fruit etc.

1-2 local items – some flexibility here – but must be longer lasting

1 Gallon milk

5-6lbs of dairy items – (One each from two column of dairy items)

5-6 lbs. Meat/egg products Meat must be precooked and only 1 pound of lunch meant is allowed.

Meat must be refrigerated or frozen (no canned meat)

Does not to be in same box - 2-3 boxes allowed, but all 3 must be delivered as one box at the same time. Milk can be delivered separately.

ONE BOX - MULTIPLE WAYS







Box Style B – still considered I box Must be delivered together

Additional requirements

Rolling application period – No deadline

Requires truck to trunk or "last mile" delivery

Subcontractors must be identified in application.

Non-profit and food pantries must be identified along with "mutually agreeable" delivery schedule.

Next round will be from Sept 1, to October 31, 2020 to finish current funding.

Do not apply for more boxes than your sure you can do.


